### Restroom Facility Complete

It may seem strange that the feature article is about the long-awaited completion of restrooms. However, there is a long history leading up to this grand finale. Patrick Hegwood, my predecessor, had a sketch made of a pavilion in 2007 when the Junior League and Baton Rouge Green began blazing trails in the Burden Woods to implement Trees & Trails. Once the trail system was opened in the spring of 2009, a year after Hurricane Gustav, the trails began to become a popular educational walk through the woods. Soon after, Project Learning Tree was implemented, and educational field trips that use the environment to engage children in learning about the flora and fauna of the ecosystems in the woodlands followed. It became evident that the idea of an outdoor shelter was a necessity. The pavilion was included in the 2009 master plan for the Botanic Gardens.

A grant was submitted to the Louisiana Recreational Trails Program to help fund the building of a pavilion. It was also decided that there was a growing need for restrooms to serve the programs, events and everyday visitors to the gardens and woodlands. The master plan placed the pavilion next to the Steele Burden Memorial Orangerie, the last building designed by A. Hays Town, a renowned architect and dear friend of Steele Burden. It was of the upmost importance that the pavilion complement the Orangerie so that there was a cohesive design of these two buildings in close proximity. A great amount of time was spent designing the pavilion. It was determined that because of the size of the pavilion, the restrooms would have to be a separate detached building. Once the design of the pavilion was complete, we began fundraising in earnest for a pavilion and restroom facility. The Friends of LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens at Burden and the Burden Foundation were the primary contributors along with many private donations and funding from the Louisiana Recreational Trails Program. Thanks to all these generous contributions, the pavilion was completed in 2014.

The next step was to complete a restroom facility; however, there were some major issues. Where would the restrooms be located and what would the building look like? After much discussion regarding site selection, design alterations and wetlands permitting, we were finally ready to begin construction. Thus, after a 13-year journey, we are truly ready to celebrate the completion of this project. The new restrooms were built to accommodate a large group of school children on a field trip, a large outdoor event or individuals that are visiting the gardens or walking the trails. The building includes a large porch as well as storage for educational programming materials. There is a diaper changing station — thank you Judy Foil — for those parents with young children.

Thank you to all our supporters who helped make this project successful. It will be a benefit to our community and all of those who visit the Botanic Gardens at Burden.

## Volunteers Hand Paint Rocks for Hundreds of Children

When Jeff Kuehny asked Ginnie Bolin, long-time volunteer and former chair of the Burden Horticulture Society, now known as Friends of LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens, to hand paint some river rocks, she immediately agreed. When she went to pick them up, however, she was taken aback. There weren't just a few rocks, but hundreds of them. She learned that they were to be hidden like Easter eggs for the hundreds of children attending the Corn Maze, the largest fundraising event at the LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens at Burden.

She immediately enlisted the help of friends Robin Coerver and Ann Davenport. The three set aside several days for the task. By the end of two days, with relatively few completed, they compared themselves to gnats on an elephant. Ginnie mentioned her despair to neighbor and fellow St. James Place resident Audrey Walker, who sympathetically offered to paint some and took as many as she could carry.

Soon realizing the magnitude of the gargantuan task, Audrey had an idea. Her granddaughter, Rebecca, a student at St. Joseph's Academy, and her grandson, Ryan, a student at Catholic High School, as well as some friends, were looking for a project to fulfill their schools' requirement that their students perform community service. Audrey's daughter, Wendy Stanford, who is Rebecca and Ryan's mother, not only liked the idea but wanted to help with the painting herself. St. Joseph's and Catholic High approved the project, and the Stanfords' "adopted" daughter, Olivia Mitchell, also a student at St. Joseph's, excitedly joined in. Audrey not only organized the project. She paid for all the supplies and painted rocks as well.

After school, on weekends and anytime they could squeeze into their busy schedules, they painted rocks and completed the project by the deadline. It took three generations in one family, several friends, talent, determination and commitment to accomplish. The Corn Maze was a success, and the children were delighted finding the beautiful original artwork that they were allowed to keep. Jokingly, when Ginnie delivered the hundreds of rocks to Burden, she said "The next time I'm asked to volunteer, I'll be sure to ask the important question, 'How many are there?"



## Byzantine Icon Workshop Returns

Friends of LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens at Burden is sponsoring a February 2021 Byzantine Icon Workshop after postponing the August event because of concerns associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. This workshop is a fundraiser for the Botanic Gardens with proceeds going to educational programs. To comply with social distancing requirements, the workshop is limited to 16 participants on a first-come, first-served basis. The cost is \$350 per person.

St. Kateri, one of our few American saints, is the selection for the upcoming workshop. We will meet at the conference room at the Burden Conference Center. The event begins Sunday, Feb. 21 and ends Friday, Feb. 26. The workshop will run Sunday from 1-3 p.m. and Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. All art supplies will be provided along with coffee and lunches.

The committee has researched COVID-19 compliance regulations in various industries and federal and state agencies, and protocols for personal safety and social distancing are in place. Masks are required in the building, and social distancing spacing at workstations will be in place to ensure the safety of our participants. Lunch will be served in closed containers with packaged utensils at each person's workstation or may be taken to the gardens.

We are grateful for our volunteer committee members, instructors and hospitality team who work so hard to provide professional instruction and meaningful historical information on each subject. Also, we send a big thank you to Jeff Kuehny, Mary Coco and the staff of the Botanic Gardens for hosting us and making our time so enjoyable.

## 2020 Master Gardener Class at the Botanic Gardens

The East Baton Rouge Parish Master Gardener program was the first Master Gardener program in the state of Louisiana. It was approved by the LSU AgCenter in 1992, and the first class was held at the LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens at Burden in 1994. The East Baton Rouge Master Gardener Association, a nonprofit organization, was formed the same year. Its mission is to:

- Extend the LSU AgCenter's educational programs.
- Assist the gardening public.
- Promote home horticulture in the Baton Rouge area.

The Botanic Gardens has been the home of the East Baton Rouge Master Gardener program for over 25 years now, and it is still going strong. They support many programs throughout the parish, including educational lectures and workshops at public libraries and at the Botanic Gardens. Master Gardeners also support school gardening, plant health clinics and the Plant Makers and the annual Master Gardener Plant Sale.

A group of Master Gardeners led by Ginnie Bolin in 2008 formed the Burden Horticulture Society, which is now Friends of LSU AgCenter Botanic Gardens at Burden. Its mission is more focused on the Botanic Gardens by enhancing and promoting the Botanic Gardens for the benefit of the public through educational programs, fundraising and volunteerism. Many of the past and present Friends board members and supporters have come from the East Baton Rouge Master Gardener program.

Because the Master Gardener program is a vital part of the Botanic Gardens and the Friends and fulfilling their missions, we felt that it was important to continue to offer the Master Gardener class to the community during the pandemic. So that we could ensure the safety and individual needs of almost everyone, the class was offered by three methods: in person, via livestream and in recorded lectures. Thanks to the efforts of extension agents from across the AgCenter Southern Region, the AgCenter Information Technology Department and multiple Botanic Gardens staff, 58 students graduated on Dec. 5. We are excited for them to join us in helping provide our community with gardening information and appreciation for the environment in which we live.
