## Introduction:

This course is designed to provide a general overview of foundations, institutions, politics and public policy of the United States. While we will deal with the historical perspectives in these areas, we will primarily focus on contemporary experiences and subjects where possible. This will provide you with the latest perspectives on our American government and how you can operate within the current system. We will examine the impact of our governmental choice on our society and culture, and investigate the future prospects for our politics and government.
